Students Participated in Research Project at the College of William & Mary

A grant from the National Science Foundation to the College of William & Mary (W&M) gave TNCC students Josh Froneberger, Shenna Sikora and Eduardo Davila-Reyes the opportunity to conduct scientific research. For 10 weeks in summer 2009, the students worked with W&M faculty on different aspects of the Eastern Bluebird (Sialia Sialis) population ecology research in the Williamsburg area. The grant-funded program was designed to provide research opportunities in Math and Biology to undergraduate students and encourage community college students to continue their education at the College of William & Mary. Students received a stipend and were provided room and board.

College Received Grant for Career Coach in Advanced Manufacturing

Thomas Nelson Community College received a grant from Virginia's Community Colleges to add a new career coach in Advanced Manufacturing to the Outreach and Recruitment Office. The career coach works with students in the Greater Peninsula high schools including the New Horizons Governor's Academy for Innovation, Technology, and Engineering (GAITE). The new career coach focuses on advising interested junior and senior high school students on the education and skill requirements for specific jobs in advanced manufacturing including robotics, green manufacturing, computer design, and modeling and simulation at such businesses as Canon, Northrop Grumman, NASA Langley Research Center and Alcoa Howmet.

TNCC, ODU and Hampton City Schools Collaboration Put Aspiring Teachers on the Path to Their Careers

Nearly 30 local residents who aspire to teaching careers started the first leg of their journey in fall 2008 when TNCC,

Hampton City Schools (HCS) and Old Dominion University launched an initiative to address a shortage of elementary and special education teachers. Called First Steps, the program gives full-time HCS employees an opportunity to earn the training and academic credentials necessary to become teachers.

Canon Virginia and TNCC Develop Unique Partnership

Canon Virginia's big expansion project locally acquired workers through its unique partnership with Thomas Nelson Community College's Workforce Development Office.

Canon, which began an expansion locally in May 2009, is one of 56 companies that partner with TNCC to find and train employees through the Southeast Virginia Advanced Manufacturing Pipeline. The first batch of 37 employees completed the training in cartridge manufacturing for Canon in September 2009.

The digital portfolios of graduating students Zach Bealer, Michelle Folts, Karen Price, Joseph Reedy, Kira Shird and Brittanie Thompson were displayed.

The show gave the aspiring graphic artists an opportunity to showcase their talent for potential employers who attended the event. Professor CeCe Wheeler, Computer Arts Department head, said HONORS ART 193 allows a fuller and freer study of subject matter in various curriculums through exploring different avenues of art making.

Student Art Displayed During Renowned Author's Book Signing at Ferguson Center for the Arts

The creative works of 15 Thomas Nelson Community College students were exhibited at the Ferguson Center for the Arts in October 2008 when award-winning mystery writer Walter Mosley met fans for a book signing and discussion.

The winning design was that of TNCC Computer Arts major Joseph Reedy but the body of work created by all of the students was so impressive that the Virginia Public Library Consortium decided to showcase many of the digitally produced four-color print pieces during the book signing.

New Studio Allowed Students' Imaginations to Run Wild

These were some of the initial images created by students using the new green-screen production studio at Thomas Nelson Community College. Those attending professor Cece Wheeler's multimedia design class in October 2008 tried it for the first time, welcoming a giant new innovation to the Computer Arts Department headed by Wheeler.

Simply put, people can be filmed in front of the solid green background. Then, using computer software, that background can be changed to any other video footage that is available.



Faculty Received Prestigious VCCS Award

Martin D. Zahn, associate professor of Biology, received the 2008 Chancellor's Award for Teaching Excellence.

Zahn has been a TNCC faculty member for 15 years bringing new dimensions to Biology instruction in the process. He incorporates technology in the classroom as a member of Virginia Community College's MERLOT project which strives to identify quality educational sites and tools on the Internet that faculty can use as modules. In addition to incorporating numerous MERLOT materials, he includes podcasting using iTunes University in the delivery of supplemental instruction.



TNCC was Host Site for First GAITE Exploratory Event

Thomas Nelson Community College was the site of the first Governor's Academy for Innovation, Technology and Engineering (GAITE) exploratory event in November 2008. Called Designing the Future, the event drew middle school students from six school divisions to the College's Hampton campus. The Department of Education selected the Greater Peninsula among its initial six Virginia sites to implement GAITE in 2008. The initiative is designed to provide programs focused on advanced academic and technical skills in school districts of Hampton City, Newport News City, Poquoson City, Williamsburg-James City County, York County and Gloucester County.

Coordinated by New Horizons Regional Education Centers, GAITE involves partners from education, business, post-secondary education, and non-profit organizations. Graduates of the Academy receive industry credentials and/or transferable college credits to TNCC, Old Dominion University and Northrop Grumman Apprentice School. Graduates will also receive employment consideration with NASA Langley Research Center, Northrop Grumman, Canon, Alcoa Howmet and other local businesses upon completion of college training.



Faculty Members Accepted in Nationally Recognized Program for Mathematics Educators

Two TNCC faculty members were accepted into the Mathematical Association of America's (MAA) Section NExT program. Section NExT (New Experiences in Teaching) is a professional development program for new college and university faculty in the mathematical sciences.

As NExT fellows, Math Instructors Libby Arnesen and Matthew Watts attended regional meetings in MAA's Maryland-District of Columbia-Virginia section. The program enabled the two educators to explore key aspects of life in academia such as teaching effectively, reform pedagogy, and getting tenure all while building relationships with other participants including senior faculty mentors assigned to them from around the MD-DC-VA region, according to the MAA.

TNCC Received Nearly \$2M to Expand Industrial Training

Thomas Nelson Community College received a \$1.99 million community-based job training grant in January 2009 from the U.S. Labor Department to expand its pipeline of employees to the manufacturing industry.

This is the College's second big national grant in the past five years. It received a \$1.95 million President's High Growth Job Training Initiative grant four years ago to create an employment pipeline in advanced manufacturing.

College Presented Third Presidential Leadership Award

Sen. Mamie E. Locke received Thomas Nelson Community College's third annual Presidential Leadership Award in a January 2009 presentation as part of the College's Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. observances.

TNCC established its Presidential Leadership Award to honor the life and work of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. by recognizing an outstanding community leader and important role model for students.

A panel of community leaders including Fort Monroe Garrison Commander Col. Anthony Reyes were part of a Thomas Nelson Community College program honoring Dr. Martin Luther King Jr.

Moderated by TNCC Speech and Humanities Chair Bette Thomas, the panel discussed Fulfilling the Dream: From King to Obama. Newport News Councilwoman Sharon Scott; TNCC Foundation Board Member Professor Emeritus Turner Spencer, Ph.D.; Daily Press Urban Affairs Columnist David Squires and Hampton-based First Baptist Church Pastor Richard W. Wills Sr., Ph.D., were also on the panel.



Grant Helped TNCC Boost Student Success in Math

Virginia's Community Colleges awarded a \$65,000 grant for TNCC faculty to create a new way of teaching developmental math. A study showed that approximately 2,000 students were enrolled in developmental math classes in the fall of 2006. However, about 50 percent dropped out before finishing. The entry-level classes, which are non-credit, must be passed before students can advance to take for-credit math classes. Developmental classes are for those whose placement test lands them in either Algebra I or Algebra II.

College was Host Site for Virginia Future Business Leaders of America's 28th Annual Spring Conference

Enterprising high school students destined to be tomorrow's business and industry heads converged on Thomas Nelson Community College in March 2009 when the Virginia Future Business Leaders of America (FBLA) held its regional spring conference on the Hampton campus.

Students competed in as many as 58 different events such as business ethics (team), impromptu speaking and job interview, to name a few. Some events took place before the conference and those events were judged as well with TNCC participating in some of the judging.

Online teaching tools will become more like video games through a program Thomas Nelson Community College's Michael Uenking began developing in 2008-2009. A supplement for regular classroom or online students, his program is designed to provide extra help in a fun and technologically savvy way.

Uenking, an Associate Professor of Mechanical Engineering Technology, received a \$2,925 grant from Virginia's Community Colleges to develop the program.

TNCC Became Official Autodesk Certified Testing Center

Thomas Nelson Community College is the new hot spot for computer aided drafting instructors in Virginia thanks to Computer Aided Drafting and Design Program Head Tom Pringle.

TNCC became an official Autodesk Certified testing center in December 2008. Pringle works in conjunction with TNCC, the U.S. Department of Education and Ron Williams Ltd., a company that provides educational tools and training for secondary and higher education institutions in the Mid-Atlantic region, to proctor the test in Virginia.

TNCC Professor was Among National History Educators at NEH Seminar

A Thomas Nelson Community College History professor was selected to participate in the National Endowment for the Humanities' (NEH) Landmarks of American History and Culture workshops for community college faculty.

Ronald A. Goldberg, Ph.D., was chosen from a pool of national applicants to attend one of six summer 2009 study opportunities. Goldberg was among 50 community college educators who experienced a round of presentations by noted scholars in their field, conducting research in the first U.S. presidential library's rich collection of Gilded Age literature and enjoying tours of the Rutherford B. Hayes Presidential Center.




TNCC Celebrated 40th Commencement Ceremony



Cagle's research, "Tropical Leaf-Cutter Ants: Is Antimicrobial Activity Exhibited during the Harvesting and Transfer of Leaves?" examines the use of chemicals secreted by the leaf-cutter ants to kill bacteria outside of their nest. Assistant Professor of Biology Jennifer Martin developed the course for her students and was accompanied in Central America by Dr. Donald K. Bartholomay, Dean of Science and Allied Health.



With state-of-the-art academic, administrative, physical plant and student/ faculty support facilities, TNCC's new site serves the needs of students and the community at large.

Available degree and certificate programs at the campus include but are not limited to: Liberal Arts, Business Administration, Emergency Medical Services, Information Technology, Nursing, Computer Arts, Computer-Aided Drafting and Design Technology and a new Dental Hygiene Program slated to open in 2010. Continuing education and Workforce Development opportunities are also available for residents of the greater Williamsburg/James City County area.

State-of-the-art Library

TNCC's new library at the Historic Triangle campus in Williamsburg opened in August 2009, giving students access to 20 computers and an additional 20 in the campus' academic lab. The College ultimately aims to provide 10,000 hard copy titles for students who use the library at the Historic Triangle campus. The library also has 10 group study rooms to accommodate the rising number of collaborative assignments that students must complete.












